Meeting opened at 9am.

Woodside provided an Acknowledgement of Country and welcomed new members to the Karratha Community Liaison Group (CLG). Round table introductions for those attending.

Meeting expectations

- Reminder to declare any perceived conflict of interest.

- Members are encouraged to share the information presented during the meeting with their communities.

Values Moment

Woodside shared a short video celebrating 20 years of Corporate Volunteering at Woodside and reflected on the value of volunteering in the community and the benefits for employees taking part.

Operations Update (refer to slides 11-13)

Woodside provided an Operations update, including on:

- Final environmental approval for the North West Shelf Project Extension
- Two Woodside hosted apprentices represented at the State Government Department of training and Workforce Development WA Training Awards
- Decommissioning a condensate tank at the Karratha Gas Plant
 - Planned Maintenance
 - LiDAR helicopter survey.

Summary of Discussion

- KDCCI asked whether there would be future scopes required to maintain the KGP facility following NWS extension approval. KGP is entering late life with one processing train already retired in 2025. Karratha Life Extension is reaching the end of its contract and future large work scopes would likely be linked to further ORO such as Browse.
- Discussion on the use of alternative technology including drones for ongoing methane monitoring.

Project Update (refer to slide 14)

- Woodside provided an update on the Scarborough Energy project including Pluto Train 2 and Pluto train 1 modifications.
- Next year Woodside will commence commissioning work. This will bring additional flaring and Woodside is preparing to engage with community so they understand this process and where they can get more information.

Summary of discussion

- Question from community member about the impact of flaring to turtles. Woodside seeks to minimise this impact by conducting planned flaring such as the commissioning outside nesting periods where possible and during daylight hours.
- Migratory bird impacts also discussed along with Woodside's approach to monitor and manage impacts including in response to changes to nesting seasons where there is evidence of this.

Housing update (refer to slides 15)

Woodside provided an update on its current housing portfolio including its long-term strategy and progress on 30 new builds being constructed to support Pluto workforce.

Summary of discussion

- Discussion on pressure that population growth is having on local schools including Baynton West Primary School which is running out of space to expand.
- Department of Education sought information on expected increase in workforce with discussion on Woodside residential policy and 70 additional residential roles that would be required to support operations at the expanded Pluto LNG facility.

Community contribution (refer to slides 17)

Woodside provided an overview of a number of recent community contributions, including:

- Scaffold from Woodside operations donated by Yarra to Roebourne Work Camp for repurposing as furniture.
- Sponsorship of the KDCCI Business Awards.
- Woodside Community Grants to open in October with an overview of eligibility and some examples of previous grant recipients.

Environment Plans (EPs) (refer to slides 18 - 25)

Woodside provided an EPs update, including:

- NWS Phase 1 P&A and TPA03 Well Intervention.
- Pluto 4D seismic survey including overview of how seismic surveys work and the mitigation strategies used to minimise impact to as low as reasonable practicable.
- Echo Yodel subsea decommissioning.
- Julimar Brunello Plug and Abandonment.

Summary of discussion

Woodside implements several controls to minimise disruption to large marine animals including whales and turtles. Woodside also looks at species such as crayfish, crabs, scampi and prawns and spawning

cycles where seismic is conducted in areas that may impact. Minimal impact is observed to smaller marine life such as phytoplankton.

Roundtable

A round table discussion took place, giving the CLG members the opportunity to provide an update from their organisation or community group.

Concerns

Woodside shared the Community Line and North West Communities email address for sharing with the broader community, in case of concerns or questions.
